Journey of the Lovers: for Bill and Frank

Journey of the Lovers, otherwise known as for Bill and Frank, is a three-part series that depicts the raw love story of The Last of Us characters Bill and Frank. The piece begins with their first encounter within a ruthless, dving world. It gradually builds into a dramatic swarm of uncontrollable emotions: of confusion, of joy, of love, of contentment, of sadness, of anger, of acceptance. About the Artists

HALLIE MORTON is a composer and multi-instrumentalist from Northern Virginia. Adarve studies composition with Dr. Maurice Wright, and Dr. Dougherty . As a performer, Adarve currently plays bass trombone, double bass, and tuba in various ensembles. He can also be seen playing electric bass for groups ranging from musical theater pit gigs to rock/funk shows in bars and venues.

DEAN QUACH is a composer, future educator, and multi-instrumentalist from Phoenixville, PA. Playing piano since he was four, he has made his way through various concert and jazz bands, as well as chamber and wind ensembles, playing various instruments such as tuba, saxophone, and bassoon. He is currently a music education and composition double major at Temple University, studying composition under Dr. William Dougherty, and additionally studies piano under concert pianist Dr. Silvanio Reis. Quach started arranging pieces around ten years old for piano to play for various school art shows and performances. Around the age of fifteen he started to arrange and compose pieces for sax quartet, wind quintet, and wind ensemble. Eventually he would organize and conduct his high school's sax quartet and wind quintet. Since then, he has composed works for wind ensemble, string quartet, cello (for his brother) and piano.

MICHAEL GABRIEL is a guitarist and composer currently in his senior year as a guitar major in the jazz studies program at Temple University.

Temple University

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades.
