## About the Artists

### About the Conductor

PATRICIA CORNETT is Director of Bands at the Boyer College of Music and Dance where she conducts the Wind Symphony and teaches advanced conducting. Prior to joining the faculty at Temple, she was Director of Bands at Cal State Fullerton where she conducted the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Winds, and taught courses in conducting and music education. She was also Visiting Assistant Professor at SUNY Potsdam's Crane School of Music. She earned her doctor of musical arts degree from the University of Michigan, master of music degree from Northwestern University, and bachelor of music dual degree in music education and saxophone performance from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst.

Cornett taught at Essex High School in Essex Junction, Vermont from 2007–2010 where she conducted three concert bands, jazz band, and taught courses in guitar and history of rock. She was also the director of instrumental music at Woodland Regional High School in Beacon Falls, Connecticut, from 2003–2005. She is published in the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series, the CBDNA Journal, The Instrumentalist, and has presented sessions at The Midwest Clinic, national CBDNA conferences, and numerous state conferences. She is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, the Conductors Guild, the Pennsylvania Music Educators Association, and the National Association for Music Education.

#### About the Soloist

Praised by the *Saxophone Journal* as "a complete virtuoso of the tenor saxophone" and by *The New York Times* for his "energetic and enlivening" performances, **MATTHEW LEVY** is a founding

member, and the executive and co-artistic director of the world-renowned <u>PRISM Quartet</u>. His creative work as a solo artist has included performances with numerous orchestras and ensembles, including the Detroit Symphony, The Philadelphia Orchestra, counter)induction, Network for New Music, Jupiter Symphony Chamber Players, and Dolce Suono Ensemble; and concert pianists Steve Beck, Matt Herskowitz, Charles Abramovic, and Robert Conway.

Levy has also collaborated with a host of choreographers and dance companies, among them Scrap Performance Group, Group Motion Dance Theater, Nai Ni Chen Dance Company, and Miro Dance Theater. His work as both a performer and composer has culminated in collaborations with leading jazz artists including Jason Moran, Bill Stewart, Ben Monder, Matt Wilson, and John Riley. He has recorded for Deutsche Grammophon, Koch International, Naxos, New Dynamic, New Focus, Grammavision, Innova, ECM, Albany, and Tzadik.

As a member of the PRISM Quartet, Levy has given USIA and USArtists International tours of China, Russia and Latin America; made concerto appearances with the Cleveland Orchestra and the Dallas Symphony; and presented recitals on Carnegie Hall's Making Music Series and with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. PRISM's collaborators are a who's who of contemporary music-makers including BMOP, Ethel, Talujon, Sō Percussion, Partch, Music From China, The Crossing, Opera Colorado, Inti-Illimani, Nick Didkovsky, and jazz artists Greg Osby, Dave Liebman, Chris Potter, Ravi Coltrane, Gerald Cleaver, and Mark Ferber. PRISM's discography includes 16 critically acclaimed recordings, four of which feature Levy's original music. PRISM is a two-time winner of the Chamber Music America/ASCAP Award for Adventurous Programming. In its founding days, PRISM was a winner of the Fischoff National Chamber Music Competition, appeared on

Entertainment Tonight and NPR's Performance Today, and was named by Musical America as "Outstanding Young Artists."

A tireless advocate for new music, Levy has commissioned numerous composers for solo works, including Paola Prestini, David Ludwig, Renee Favand, and Ellwood Derr. His work with PRISM has resulted in commissions of more than 250 saxophone quartets, many from winners of the Pulitzer Prize, MacArthur "Genius" Award, Rome Prize, Koussevitzky Award, Doris Duke Artist Award, and Guggenheim Fellowship. Commissioned composers include William Bolcom, Bright Sheng, Zhou Long, Miguel Zenón, Jennifer Higdon, Steven Mackey, Ken Ueno, Martin Bresnick, Chen Yi, Bernard Rands, Miguel Zenon, and Steve Lehman.

Levy holds three degrees from the University of Michigan, where he was a James B. Angell Scholar and recipient of the Lawrence Teal Award. His primary saxophone teacher was Donald Sinta. He is a Selmer artist and plays Selmer saxophones and mouthpieces exclusively.

## About the Composer-in-Residence

Irish composer **EMMA O'HALLORAN** is interested in joy, wonder, hope, and connection, and her music is driven by a desire to capture the magic of what it means to be human. Freely intertwining acoustic and electronic music, O'Halloran has written for folk musicians, chamber ensembles, turntables, laptop orchestra, symphony orchestra, opera, and theatre, and her work has been described as "intensely beautiful" (*Washington Post*) and "unencumbered, authentic, and joyful" (*I Care If You Listen*).

Known for her unique ability to fuse elements of pop, rock and electronic music while exploring the colors and textures of acoustic instruments, her work has found a wide audience and has been featured at various music festivals such as Classical NEXT, PODIUM Esslingen, New Music Dublin, Tokyo's Born Creative Festival, and Bang on a Can LOUD Weekend. Additionally, her music has been performed by Crash Ensemble, Friction Quartet, Kaleidoscope Chamber Orchestra, ensemble reflektor, PRISM Quartet, and the Irish National Symphony Orchestra, amongst others.

In recent years, O'Halloran's passion for storytelling has led her to explore multidisciplinary projects such as soundwalks and opera. She has written works for Irish National Opera, Boston Lyric Opera, Beth Morrison Projects, and her recent operas, *TRADE* and *Mary Motorhead*, received rave reviews from their performances at LA Opera and New York's PROTOTYPE Festival with the *LA Times* calling her "a kind of modern-day Monteverdi."

O'Halloran loves working with people of all ages to explore and create music, and she has served as a mentor for various composition programs in Ireland and the United States. In 2021, in partnership with the Irish National Concert Hall, she founded the Creative Lab, an award-winning mentorship program for young composers from traditionally underrepresented groups in music composition.

O'Halloran holds a PhD in music composition from Princeton University and is currently working as a freelance composer. Current and future projects include works for PRISM Quartet, Chamber Choir Ireland, and a new opera with Naomi Louisa O'Connell.

#### Boyer College of Music and Dance

The Boyer College of Music and Dance offers over 500 events open to the public each year. Students have the unique opportunity to interact with leading performers, composers, conductors, educators, choreographers and guest artists while experiencing a challenging and diverse academic curriculum. The Boyer faculty are recognized globally as leaders in their respective fields. Boyer alumni are ambassadors of artistic leadership and perform with major orchestras, opera and dance companies, teach at schools and colleges and work as professional music therapists, choreographers and composers. Boyer's recording label, BCM&D records, has produced more than thirty recordings, five of which have received Grammy nominations.

### The Center for the Performing and Cinematic Arts

A hallmark of the School of Theater, Film and Media Arts is the Los Angeles Study Away program, housed at historic Raleigh Studios. The George and Joy Abbott Center for Musical Theater engages visiting performers, guest artists, set designers, playwrights and other Broadway professionals. The Temple Performing Arts Center (TPAC), a historic landmark on campus, is home to a state-of-theart 1,200 seat auditorium and 200 seat chapel. More than 500 concerts, classes, lectures and performances take place at TPAC each year.

#### Temple University

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades. Today, Temple's more than 35,000 students continue to follow the university's official motto—Perseverantia Vincit, or "Perseverance Conquers"—with their supreme dedication to excellence in academics, research, athletics, the arts and more.
