# A Letter from the Chair

It's been a privilege and pleasure to help guide the celebration of Temple Dance Department's half century of transformative artmaking, education, scholarship, and community. This milestone year was launched in September 2024 with the premiere of alumnus Terry Beck's (BFA 1979) *Harbour* at Tomlinson Theater. Throughout the year, we have been inspired by distinguished alumni speakers and guest artists from across the decades. The history of Temple Dance is being portrayed in two exhibitions, one comprehensive treatment in the Charles Library Exhibition Space, and another in the Charles L. Blockson Collection, focused on the long Temple career of the late Dr. Kariamu Welsh (1949-2019). Both exhibits will remain open through the 8th of May.

Since yesterday morning, some 150 alumni have been in reunion here on main campus, along with three of the faculty considered to be cofounders of the Department: Dr. Edrie Ferdun, Hellmut Gottschild and Dr. Sarah Alberti Hilsendager, as well as other Temple Dance faculty pioneers of the 70s and 80s: Ann Vachon, Dr. Brenda Dixon Gottschild, Philip Grosser, and Dr. Luke C. Kahlich.

Tonight, we embrace the entire half century with a mosaic of short works and excerpts by founding, former and current faculty along with alumni and current students. The show highlights the Department's core value of diversity, which has been alive from the beginning – diversity of faculty, students, programs and ideas.

To our live audience here in North Philadelphia and on livestream around the world, I treasure your presence and support in recognizing Temple Dance on this momentous occasion. There is no doubt in my mind and heart that you are all sowing vital and essential seeds for the future of artful living.

Through fluid, expressive movements that evolve from restrained to expansive, the dancer embodies the mayfly's journey—from emergence to a graceful acceptance of its brief, powerful life.

**OLIVIA MOHSEN AL SAMADI** is a First-Generation Palestinian American dancer, choreographer, educator, and scholar. Temple University Fellow and Master of Fine Arts in Dance student.

**DR. EDRIE FERDUN** was a member of the Temple faculty from 1967 until 1996 and Co-Founder of the Department of Dance in 1975. She was given the Lindback Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1983 and Temple University's Great Teacher Award in 1996.

**JILLIAN HARRIS** is an associate professor of dance and the BFA coordinator at Temple University. Jillian researches new models and platforms for dance-based collaborations.

**DR. YATANDE WHITNEY V. HUNTER** serves as Assistant Professor of Dance and Coordinator of the African Diaspora Dance Series at Temple University. He researches the convergences of sacred and secular ritual through Afro-Spiritualit(ies), and Africanist principles as AfrOist aesthetic in contemporary dance-performance.

#### **Temple University**

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades. Today, Temple's more than 35,000 students continue to follow the university's official motto—Perseverantia Vincit, or "Perseverance Conquers"—with their supreme dedication to excellence in academics, research, athletics, the arts and more.
