She also spent a week conducting the International Youth Band at the International Music Camp on the border of North Dakota and Canada, a week conducting at the Worcester Summer Music Institute in Massachusetts, and another week conducting the World Youth Wind Symphony at the Interlochen Arts Camp in Michigan.

MARCUS DELOACH (Vocal Arts)

This spring, Marcus DeLoach gave the world premiere of composer Karim Al-Zand's new song group *Vespertine Songs*, as well as several other songs, which were all written for him at Rice University (Houston, TX). He was also invited to give a presentation on his own original songs at the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS) 2024 Eastern Region Conference at West Chester University (West Chester, PA) that included the premiere of his new voice and piano arrangement of "The Streets of Laredo." MICHAEL KLEIN (Music Studies)

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WENDY MAGEE (Music Therapy)

Wendy Magee has had three publications (peer-reviewed journals and a book chapter) in recent months relating to music therapy in stroke rehabilitation, the neuroscientific foundations for using music as sensory stimulation in disorders of consciousness, and music therapy to facilitate relationship completion for patients at the end of life. As part of building a student exchange program between TU and SRH Hochschule Heidelberg in Germany, Magee was awarded a grant from the German Academic Exchange Service financed by the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research in Spring. This will fund a forthcoming exchange to strengthen existing research collaborations and build student exchange opportunities. Her existing international multisite trial collecting data on music therapy assessment with children with disorders of consciousness (funded by a GRAMMY award) has expanded to a new site in Ireland. This work is related to an international scoping study she is participating in with the International Brain Injury Association (Disorders of Consciousness Special Interest Group) and that began over the summer.

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PHILLIP O'BANION (Instrumental Studies)

Phillip O'Banion performed as percussionist in dozens of concerts with The Philadelphia Orchestra this spring and summer, including at the Kimmel Center, Carnegie Hall and tours and residencies in Canada (Toronto, Ottawa, Montreal), Ann Arbor, the Mann Center, Bravo! Vail Music Festival and the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. He also performed concerts with Network for New Music, Singing City chorus, the symphonies in Reading, Delaware and Lancaster, and was a featured guest soloist with the PA Sinfonia Orchestra in the world premiere of Jamie Allen's "Nightingale Concerto."

Members of his studio and ensemble were accepted for study at summer music festivals including the National Orchestral Institute, Brevard Music Festival and Sewanee Music Center. Students also won first place in the Pennsylvania Percussive Arts Society 2024 collegiate snare drum competition (statewide competition), placed third in the national Modern Snare Drum Competition in Cleveland, and successfully auditioned for the New World Symphony sub list. Recent alumni from the studio won positions with the Hankyung Arte Philharmonic in Seoul, Korea and the Colorado Music Festival in Boulder.

O'Banion also completed his sixth summer as a percussion faculty member at the Sewanee Music Center in Tennessee and taught a percussion workshop for the Wildflower Composers summer composition program.
