She serves on the faculties of the Amherst Early Music Festival, the Curtis Young Artists Summer Program, and the Viola da Gamba Society of Lardin Conclave. co-directs Night America Philadelphia-based period instrument chamber ensemble focused on music of the Revolutionary and Romantic eras. Night Music's debut recording "Music for a Viennese Salon" Avie Records was released by Avie Recods in August 2020. A graduate of the Curtis Institute of Music, Ms. Lardin holds a DMA in Historical Performance Practice from Cornell University.
