About the Artists

STEPHANIE CHASE is internationally recognized as "one of the violin greats of our era" (Newhouse Newspapers) through solo appearances with over 170 orchestras that include the New York and Hong Kong Philharmonics and the Chicago, San Francisco, Atlanta and London Symphony Orchestras. Her interpretations are acclaimed for their "elegance, dexterity, rhythmic vitality and great imagination" (Boston Globe), "stunning power" (Louisville Courier-Journal), "matchless technique" (BBC Music Magazine), and "virtuosity galore" (Gramophone). Her performances have been selected as a "Classical Act of the Decade" (Courier-Journal, Louisville), one of "20 Concerts to Hear this Fall" (WQXR) and "Critics' Choice" (Musical America).

A top medalist of the prestigious VII International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow, Ms. Chase has performed concerts in twenty-five countries throughout the world and is a recipient of the esteemed Avery Fisher Career Grant.

Equally at home in the virtuoso's repertoire, historically informed performance practice and contemporary music, Ms. Chase offers a diverse repertoire of over 60 concertos and large works for violin and orchestra. Her recordings include Beethoven's Violin Concerto, which is "one of the twenty most outstanding performances in the work's recorded history" (Beethoven: Violin Concerto; Cambridge University Press) and honored with the highest possible ratings by BBC Music Magazine and Classic CD, including "Record of the Month."

Born in Illinois, Stephanie Chase's early violin teachers were her mother and Sally Thomas, and she was renowned as a child prodigy through concert performances starting at age two. She made her debut with the Chicago Symphony at eight and began extensive national concert touring while in her early teens. Following her Carnegie Hall debut at eighteen, she studied violin privately with Arthur Grumiaux in Belgium and chamber music at the famed Marlboro Festival in Vermont.

Ms. Chase often performs in the dual roles of violin soloist and conductor, and she is a favorite guest of chamber music festivals such as the Newport Music Festival, Bravo! Vail, Bargemusic, and Vietnam Connections. Her violin was made in 1742 by Petrus Guarnerius of Venice.

Cellist **JEFFREY SOLOW's** compelling playing has enthralled audiences throughout North America, Europe, Latin America and Asia as soloist, chamber musician and teacher. Born and raised in Los Angeles, he studied with Gabor Rejto and earned a degree in Philosophy *magna cum laude* from UCLA while studying with and then assisting the legendary Gregor Piatigorsky at USC.

His winning the Young Concert Artists International Auditions launched a career that has encompassed performances of more than 40 different solo works with orchestras including the Los Angeles Philharmonic (also at the Hollywood Bowl), Japan Philharmonic, Prime Philharmonic (Korea), VNOB Symphony (Vietnam), Seattle Symphony, Milwaukee Symphony, Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, and the American Symphony (with whom he also recorded). He has also presented recitals throughout the US and in Europe, Japan, Korea, China, Central and South America, and has been guest artist at many national and international chamber music festivals. His recordings, two of which have been nominated for Grammy Awards, can be found on the Columbia, ABC, New World, Centaur, Delos, Kleos, Capstone, Everest, Music Masters and Telefunken labels. Since live concerts have begun again he completed his 10th cycle of Bach's Suites for solo cello at Bargemusic in NYC.

Mr. Solow's numerous editions are published by Breitkopf, International Music Company, Peters, Presser, Latham, Ovation and Henle Urtext, and the London Cello Society Newsletter, Strad magazine (London), Strings magazine, and American String Teacher have published his articles and reviews. He was editor of the Newsletter of the Violoncello Society, Inc. of NY and served as VCS president, and he is a past president of the American String Teachers Association. Recognized worldwide as an outstanding teacher, Jeffrey Solow has presented master classes throughout the United States as well as in Switzerland, Austria, Korea, Guatemala, Norway, France, Argentina, Canada, at the Beijing, Shanghai, Sichuan, Nanning and WuHan conservatories in China, and at the Chiang Kai-Shek National Library in Taiwan. He has been professor of cello at Temple University since 1989 and was recently presented with the Lindback Award for distinguished Teaching.

SARA DAVIS BUECHNER is one of the leading concert pianists of our time, a musician of "intelligence, integrity and all-encompassing technical prowess" (New York Times), with "sovereign command of the keyboard" (Los Angeles Times). Japan's InTune magazine says: "When it comes to clarity, flawless tempo selection, phrasing and precise control of timbre, Buechner has no superior."

She was the Gold Medalist of the 1984 Gina Bachauer International Piano Competition, and a Bronze Medalist in the 1986 Tschaikowsky International Piano Competition in Moscow.

With an active repertoire of more than 100 piano concertos ranging from A (Albeníz) to Z (Zimbalist) -- possibly the largest of any living concert pianist -- she has been soloist with many of the world's prominent orchestras, and given recitals at Carnegie Hall, the Kennedy Center and the Hollywood Bowl. Ms. Buechner enjoys wide success throughout Asia where she tours annually.

Sara Davis Buechner is the most prominent transgender musician appearing on the classical concert stage today, and has been lauded as a champion of LGBTQ+ rights. She received the Eleanor Roosevelt Award of Brandeis University, and is a member of the National Museum of Women in the Arts.

Dr. Buechner is a Professor of Music at Temple University, has taught and given master classes at prominent music institutions worldwide, and has edited important piano collections for Dover Publications. Her own compositions are published by Muse Press of Tokyo. In 2022 she will mark her 35th year as a dedicated Yamaha artist.
