About the Artists

EPHRAT "BOUNCE" ASHERIE is a New York City based b-girl, performer and choreographer/director. A 2016 Bessie Award Winner for Innovative Achievement in Dance, Asherie has received numerous awards to support her work including Dance Magazine's Inaugural Harkness Promise Award and a National Dance Project Award. Asherie is currently a 2021-22 Jerome Hill Artist Fellow. Her new work UnderScored, commissioned by Works & Process at the Guggenheim, was awarded a 2019 Creation and Development Award from the National Performance Network. This multi-faceted project, which includes archiving the oral histories of elders from New York City's underground dance community, as well as an evening length dance-theater work, will premiere in fall 2022. Asherie earned her BA from Barnard College, Columbia University in Italian and her MFA from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee where she researched the vernacular jazz dance roots of contemporary street and club dances. She is honored to have been mentored by Richard Santiago (aka Break Easy) and to have worked and collaborated with Buddha Stretch, Bill Irwin, Michelle Dorrance, Doug Elkins, Gus Solomons Jr., and Rennie Harris. Asherie is a co-founding member of the all-female house dance collective MAWU and is forever grateful to NYC's underground dance community for inspiring her to pursue a life as an artist.

EMMA SUE EWING is a Pittsburgh native and a fourth-year BFA student at Temple University studying dance, sociology, and medicine. Studying ballet, modern, West African dance styles, improvisation, Umfundalai, hip hop, and musical theater have all been important to Emma's dance training. Recently, she worked closely with yonTande Whitney Hunter over the COVID-19 pandemic as a member of the Temple Dance Ensemble to create film dance works. Emma enjoys exploring dance though human interaction and vice-versa, and will continue to do so in upcoming performances and choreographic work.

LIA HAYNES is a current third year student in Boyer's dance department from Plainfield, New Jersey, pursuing a double major in Dance and Africology and African American Studies. She began her dance training at three years old, beginning with Ballet and Tap. Over the years she began training in other styles such as Jazz, Horton, Graham, Contemporary, Lyrical, Hip Hop, Umfundalai and West African dance techniques. With her broad interest in various dance styles and her passion for social justice and education, it has led her to choreographing and teaching dance locally in New Jersey and internationally in Ghana. In the future, Lia plans to continue performing and teaching dance through an Afrocentric perspective to create socially challenging narratives both on and off stage.

HYUN-JI JEON is a MA student in the Dance Department at Temple University. She has a strong background in modern/ contemporary dance and has been immersed in improvisation, choreography, and dance education. Her dance training began at five years old in South Korea. She holds a BFA from Chung-ang University and studied at Kaywon Highschool of Arts. She started her training with ballet and now she enjoys the freedom of improvisational movements. Hyun-Ji participated in several dance competitions as a dancer and a choreographer. In 2019, she won a silver prize from the Federation of International Dance Festival Asia and the best choreography prize from the Korea International Contemporary Dance Competition. She is now expanding her career to dance educator and researcher in the US.

SABRINA MILLER is a first-year BFA dance major at Temple University. Sabrina began her dance training at Dance Revelation, a local Dance studio in central Pennsylvania. At Dance Revelation Sabrina joined the Ballet Conservatory where she studied primarily Ballet, Jazz, Hip-Hop, Contemporary, Improvisation, and Modern. Through various guest teachers Sabrina also has studied Musical Theater, Tap, and Ballroom. She danced there from age eleven to age seventeen. Sabrina also attended Capital Area School for the Arts Charter School (CASA) for all four years of High School. Sabrina's

art disciple was dance, and there she was able to further indulge herself into her passion. While at CASA she was taught by Rosemary Battista and Tori Sexsmith, who taught Sabrina about dance history, composition/choreography, how to work as an ensemble, how to collaborate with other art forms, etc.. Sabrina has recently joined a small company founded by Meg Allison. This company is primarily dance focused, but does collaborate with many amazing artists of different modalities. Sabrina is excited to see where her journey at Temple University will take her in her dance career.

LAUREN MOCHNAL is a fourth-year BFA student at Temple University studying Dance and Psychology. Her dance training began at Dance 2000 School of the Performing Arts in her hometown of Scotch Plains, NJ, where she studied ballet, tap, jazz, modern, and lyrical for eight years. Prior to her time at Temple, Lauren graduated from the Union County Vocational Technical School's Academy for Performing Arts as a dance major, completed an internship with Carolyn Dorfman Dance, and studied at Princeton Ballet School and the Martha Graham School. Throughout her undergraduate studies, Lauren had the privilege of studying improvisation, choreography, Umfundalai and more. She is currently a member of the National Dance Education Organization and two honor societies at Temple: the National Honor Society for Dance Arts and Psi Chi, the International Honor Society in Psychology.

TIANA SANDERS is a teaching dance artist from Wilmington, Delaware. She is a senior BFA student at Temple University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania as a dance major. She received her Associate's degree in General Business from Delaware Technical Community College in August 2021. She is currently the Hip-Hop dance teacher at Christina Cultural Arts Center (CCAC), for the 2021-2022 season. She has received opportunities to teach classes such as African dance, Hip-Hop, and Modern at CCAC along with many partnering programs. She trained under Dara Meredith, LaCeda Nelson, Raye Jones Avery, Shawn Lamere Williams, and Charon Mapp.

Having all come from different backgrounds, these dancers have spent the last four years training in European concert styles, African Diasporic techniques, and improvisation. Megan Bridge and Marion Ramirez have not only trained these dancers in a variety of improvisational techniques, but helped open their minds about what dance can be and look like. Between the time they have spent together as a cohort and the growth they have discovered through improvisation, these dancers have been able to create a close-knit community and become in tune with each other while dancing.

MELANIE SMITH is a junior at Temple University pursuing her BFA in Dance with a Political Science minor. She started her training at a Royal Academy of Dance school in Tecumseh, Michigan. After moving to the Philadelphia area, she danced competitively for six years with Beth Jacobsen School of Dance. Temple University

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades. Today, Temple's more than 35,000 students continue to follow the university's official motto—Perseverantia Vincit, or "Perseverance Conquers"—with their supreme dedication to excellence in academics, research, athletics, the arts and more.
