About the Artists

BRYELLE DEEMER was born and raised in Easton, Pennsylvania. Her dance training started at Miss Pat's Stage Door Studio when she was two years old studying ballet, tap, jazz, hip-hop, lyrical, and pointe. She expanded her training while attending the Lehigh Valley Charter Middle and High School for the Arts majoring in dance, studying ballet, pointe, improv, and modern. She has also attended summer intensives in New York and Connecticut. For the past two years, she is the contemporary and hip-hop instructor at Miss Pat's Stage Door Studio. She is currently attending Temple University majoring in dance graduating in May 2022 with her BFA.

EMMA SUE EWING is a Pittsburgh native and a fourth-year BFA student at Temple University studying dance, sociology, and medicine. Emma has studied under Umfundalai masters Josephine Hearns and Saleana Pettaway, Maria Caruso of Maria Caruso's Bodiography, and Kun Yang Lin of Kun Yang Lin/Dancers. Studying ballet, modern, West African dance styles, improvisation, Umfundalai, hip hop, and musical theater have all been important to Emma's dance training. She enjoys exploring dance through human interaction and vice-versa. Recently, Emma presented original solo works in the 2022 World Water Day Concert and in the 2022 Student Dance Concert, and has received the 2022 Rose Vernick Scholar Award from Temple Dance Department faculty. Upcoming performances include the Spring 2022 Endings Concert, where she will perform her second studio research-based work by Ella-Gabriel Mason. Emma is grateful beyond words to her family, dance cohort, teachers, sisters, and friends for their constant support.

EMMA GENTILE is a fourth-year BFA student majoring in dance at Temple University in Philadelphia, PA. She has been immersed in the dance world since birth but officially started her training at age 12 at DanceWorks Studios in Montclair, NJ. Gentile is trained in ballet, modern, tap, jazz, hip hop, African Diasporic techniques, and improvisation. In addition to her technical training, she is passionate about choreographing. Throughout her dance career Emma has had many amazing opportunities to perform locally and even globally in dance festivals throughout New Jersey, New York, Philadelphia and Europe.

SERENA MAXIMILIEN was born and raised in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. She started her dance training at five years old, at Artcho Danse where she studied Haitian folklore, modern, ballet, jazz, hip-hop, and ballroom dancing. After graduating high school, she moved to New York City and took a gap year to focus on her craft by enrolling in the International Student Visa Program at Broadway Dance Center. At BDC, she studied ballet, contemporary jazz, tap, commercial hip-hop, West African, and theater. In 2019, she graduated with her Associate's degree in Performing Arts at Westchester Community College in Valhalla, NY, and was one of the recipients of the Kathryn Davis Global Community Scholarship. Currently, Serena is pursuing her BFA in dance at Temple University and will be graduating this spring.

LAUREN MOCHNAL is a fourth-year BFA student at Temple University studying Dance and Psychology. Her dance training began at Dance 2000 School of the Performing Arts in her hometown of Scotch Plains, NJ, where she studied ballet, tap, jazz, modern, and lyrical for eight years. Prior to her time at Temple, Lauren graduated from the Union County Vocational Technical School's Academy for Performing Arts as a dance major, completed an internship with Carolyn Dorfman Dance, and studied at Princeton Ballet School and the Martha Graham School. She is currently a member of the National Dance Education Organization and two honor societies at Temple: the National Honor Society for Dance Arts and Psi Chi, the International Honor Society in Psychology.

The George and Joy Abbott Center for Musical Theater engages visiting performers, guest artists, set designers, playwrights and other Broadway professionals. The Temple Performing Arts Center (TPAC), a historic landmark on campus, is home to a state-of-the-art 1,200 seat auditorium and 200 seat chapel. More than 500 concerts, classes, lectures and performances take place at TPAC each year.

Temple University

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades. Today, Temple's more than 35,000 students continue to follow the university's official motto—Perseverantia Vincit, or "Perseverance Conquers"—with their supreme dedication to excellence in academics, research, athletics, the arts and more.
