About the Composers

AMY ANTWI is a composer and guitarist currently studying at Temple University.

ELI WYNN (b. 2005) is a Pittsburgh based composer, multi-instrumentalist, producer, and educator, who currently resides in Philadelphia. She is perusing a Bachelor's in Music Composition at Temple University's Boyer College of Music and Dance, where she studied with William Dougherty, Erin Busch, and David Bennet Thomas. Eli is the president of conTemplum, Temple University's student organization for performing new student works. At 3, Eli's passion for playing piano like her brother ignited a lifelong love for learning instruments, creating sonic worlds, and challenging barriers through music. Versed in piano, guitar, tenor saxophone, voice, and didgeridoo, Eli has performed in punk, rock, jazz, orchestral, wind, concert, electronic, and baroque ensembles. Listening exclusively to The Grateful Dead until adolescence shapes a musician. No matter how far Eli's music wanders, its roots lie in the Dead's easygoing, seriously playful, medicinal nature. Her sound blends amorphous ambient with the tongue-in-cheek of EDM.

MIKE RAYMOND is a guitarist and composer from Philadelphia, PA. He has studied with guitarists Kevin Hanson and Greg Kettinger, as well as composers and arrangers including Erin Busch, Norman David, and Jack Saint Clair.

BARBARA LEWANDOWSKI is a music composition and theatre student at Temple University, and the concert coordinator of conTemplum, with a focus in writing new works of musical theatre. She has studied under Spicer Carr and Erin Busch and has composed for the Temple New Music Ensemble, Temple Swinging Voices Jazz Choir, and Mendelssohn Chorus PA.

WILLIAM CZARTORYSKI grew up in Bucks County, Pennsylvania and started his musical studies on piano at the age of 7, and later began studying the French horn and composing. He now attends Temple University's Boyer College of Music and Dance as a Horn Performance major as well as a Composition major. Although he is a relatively new composer, William has performed in various ensembles, such as those in the Philadelphia Youth Orchestra Music Institute, Temple University Symphony Orchestra, Temple University Wind Symphony, and several Temple chamber ensembles.

AYLEN VARGAS is a junior at Temple University and a new conTemplum member who has been composing for over 3 years, having written for a variety of voicings and instrumentation. This is the first premiere of a work for this promising young composer, who is thankful for this opportunity!

MICHAEL POGUDIN (b. 2004) is an American-based composer in Philadelphia who currently attends Temple University. He began studying music in middle school and quickly took an interest in classical music and composition. Since then, he has studied with composers such as Igor Iachimciuc, Charles Peck, and David Bennet Thomas. He has had work premiered in concerts and festivals such as the Allentown Symphony New Chamber Series and the Penn State 2025 International Symposium. Heavily influenced by both classical and jazz composers, Michael enjoys telling a story and theme in each of his pieces that usually remains unknown, with the intent being that the audience creates their own story as they listen.

HALLIE MORTON is a composer and multi-instrumentalist from Northern Virginia. They are currently a student at Temple University's Boyer College of Music and Dance, majoring in Music Technology and Composition while serving as the vice president of conTemplum. Morton previously studied with Dr. Matthew Greenbaum and Dr. Erin Busch and is currently studying under Dr. David Bennett Thomas. Inspired by a wide range of genres, she has created numerous pieces that explore the complexities of 'being.' Their pieces have been performed during various conTemplum SoundPrints programs, as well as by Temple's New Music Ensemble. As she continues to experiment with new sounds and skills, Morton hopes to reflect as many angles of the human experience as possible.

Temple University

Temple University's history begins in 1884, when a young working man asked Russell Conwell if he could tutor him at night. It wasn't long before he was teaching several dozen students—working people who could only attend class at night but had a strong desire to make something of themselves. Conwell recruited volunteer faculty to participate in the burgeoning night school, and in 1888 he received a charter of incorporation for "The Temple College." His founding vision for the school was to provide superior educational opportunities for academically talented and highly motivated students, regardless of their backgrounds or means. The fledgling college continued to grow, adding programs and students throughout the following decades. Today, Temple's more than 35,000 students continue to follow the university's official motto—Perseverantia Vincit, or "Perseverance Conquers"—with their supreme dedication to excellence in academics, research, athletics, the arts and more.
